

**GENERAL INFORMATION**

- All courses are online, accelerated, and must be completed within the designated weeks given for completion. Students may take all courses or choose to take just one course in the order listed below under Semesters.
- No more than three courses are taken at a time without special written consideration from the administration office.
- Due dates / Honor status: Following the weekly due dates will ensure you stay on track and don't fall behind in your studies. Only students who complete their assignments on or before the due dates will be eligible for Honor status, if grades qualify.
- Fees for each course is due 1 week prior to taking a particular course. Students may pay the entire semester fees in full at any time. A payment plan is also available if you take a full course load. A full course load constitutes the full semester's classes. If you are not taking a full course load you are required to pay the course fees as you take a specific course.
- Payments are made through the Ascent online learning management site.
- All course work is submitted through the Ascent online learning management site.
- Courses are taken according to the date under the title of the course. Consideration for taking courses out of the date order will be made on an individual basis.
- Associate level courses are to be completed before proceeding to Bachelor courses.
- Required books: purchase any required books before you begin a course. You will find these located under the course title. Most books are available at online stores for under \$20.
- Transcripts from previous institutions may be considered for transfer of credits to Ascent.
- Please submit transcripts received from other institutions for consideration with your application. These may be emailed or mailed.
- You must have a High School diploma, GED or show proof you are currently obtaining a GED to apply.
- Access to the learning management system will be given once a student is accepted into Ascent College.
- Student ID's will be issued after the student has enrolled in the first course.

APOLOGETICS 1

10 weeks: Jan. 14 – Mar. 25

Cost: \$100

Professor: John Holland

Course description: Apologetics deals with answering critics who oppose or question the revelation of God in Christ and the Bible. The purpose of this class is helping the Christian to "always be ready to make a defense to everyone who asks them to give an account for the hope they have."

INTRODUCTION TO HERMENEUTICS 1

Course description: Evangelical Christians affirm the Scriptures as God's inerrant word, but we still disagree sometimes over the meaning of particular verses or passages. And these differences can influence our Christian doctrine and practice. One reason for these disagreements is that there are many different approaches to interpreting the Bible. In this course we will discover approaches to interpretation and which is the most responsible.

BIBLE SURVEY OLD TESTAMENT

Course description: This course helps students to understand the basic understanding of the overarching message and content of Old Testament Scripture. Discover how topics relate to the fundamental worldview of the Bible, and to the big picture of the Scripture. Each part of Scripture contributes to this big picture and when students come to understand the main story of the Bible, many of the things previously known come into clearer focus. Confusing things will begin to make sense. Students will realize how each part of the Bible contributes to this meaning, and will be better prepared to use the whole Bible in their lives and ministries.

Course description: Modern evangelical theology is extremely diverse. Even those only somewhat familiar with Christian doctrines are aware that devout believers have different views on many topics. Others wonder if theological unity is even a worthy goal. How are followers of Jesus to determine what theological convictions to hold? And what is more, how do we decide what level of conviction to assign to any particular Christian belief? What role does interpreting Scripture play? What can we learn from the hundreds of years of church tradition? How about our present church community? And what part should individual Christian living and judgment play? This course will give you clear answers to all of these questions.

BIBLE SURVEY NEW TESTAMENT

Course description: This course explores the two fundamental features of the New Testament by examining why the NT gives so much attention to the Kingdom of God and how the central themes relate to the new covenant in Christ, where they originated, and what they mean for us today

BUILDING YOUR THEOLOGY

Course description: Explore typical definitions, and describe and evaluate the perspectives of these definitions. Define what Christian theology is, explores the theological traditions that gave shape to Christian theology, and outline the basic tenets of Reformed theology. Explores what the Scriptures teach about revelation, the dynamics of understanding revelation, and how to develop confidence in theological conclusions. Summarizes the outlooks on theological authority in the Medieval Roman Catholic Church, the early Protestant Church and in contemporary Protestantism.

Course description: Hermeneutics is the science and art of interpretation. Students will learn to be responsible Christians and apply hermeneutics through this course to see the Bible as the infallible, inspired Word of God, and seek to apply its original meanings to the modern world.

BOOK OF HEBREWS

2 weeks: Apr. 15 – May 6

Course description: Students will learn that Hebrews is one of the most challenging books in the New Testament. Many of its topics and themes are difficult to understand, and it tends to approach them differently than other New Testament books. But it helps when we recognize that the original audience was facing persecution and that they were tempted to turn away from Christ. That's why the author of

Hebrews placed his emphasis on standing strong in the faith, and it's why this book is one of the most valuable and encouraging to Christians in every age.

CHRISTIAN ETHICS

PAUL'S PRISON EPISTLES

Course description: As Christians we face many challenges to our faith. False teachings and worldviews assault our loyalty to Christ. Suffering tempts us to think that God is not in control, or that he does not have our best interests at heart. And our relationships with other believers are often strained to the point that we doubt the value of the church. In this course you will learn that Paul had incredible responses to these types of difficulties — responses that he outlined in his letters from prison that we can apply to our life today.

PRIMEVAL HISTORY

THE GOSPELS

Course description: The first four books of the New Testament — Matthew, Mark, Luke and John — are commonly known as "the Gospels." In this course students will learn and be able to explain the life and ministry of Jesus, and the basis for most of the distinctive doctrines of Christianity.

THE PENTATEUCH

Course description: The first five books of the Old Testament are commonly called the Pentateuch. They tell the story of the nation of Israel from creation to preparation for the conquest of the Promised Land. ABRAHAM

Course description: Christians, Muslims, and Jews all look to the patriarch Abraham as the father of their faiths, but these religions draw very different conclusions from his biography. This course explores the account of Abraham's life in Genesis from a distinctly Christian perspective in order to answer questions such as: What did these stories mean for those who first received them? And what do they mean for us today?

Course description: The Book of Acts, also called "The Acts of the Apostles," records the establishment of the early church under the leadership of the Apostles, and the activity and growth of the church during the middle of the first century. This course summarizes the structure, content, original meaning and modern application of the Book of Acts.

BOOK OF REVELATION

3 weeks: Feb. 25 – Mar. 18

Cost: \$75

Category: Bible (BI13411)

Professor: Dr. Cindy Byler

Course description: The Book of Revelation records dramatic visions about the role of Jesus and the church in the history of the world. Its imagery can be confusing as it's so foreign to students. The overall message is clear: King Jesus is returning in victory. This course summarizes the structure, content, original meaning and modern application of the Book of Revelation. Students will conclude this course with a comparison of the Book of Acts and the Book of Revelation.

RESEARCH COURSE

6 weeks: Mar. 18 – May 6

Cost: \$180

Course description: The final Bachelor level research paper will be in the form of a casual analysis essay. Students will select one figure from a pre-chosen list. Report on things pertaining to what that figure does to exemplify their position on the effect of movies (TV), or advertising in American culture. Students will report on what Biblical principles say about their findings.
